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This year, in each newsletter we will feature a different beneficiary. Here is Felix's story of survival.

I'm always amazed by the perseverance of our beneficiaries. Felix stands out for what he has been able to accomplish in spite of hardships.

Felix is twenty-one years old from Ankamu and is currently living in Kasoa. He is the fourth of eight children. After his parents' divorce, at seven years old, he was trafficked three times to different masters by his father.

Felix was first trafficked to the Ivory Coast, where he spent three months of his life. He was then sold for \$3 and sent to a village along the Volta Lake. Felix was subsequently trafficked for \$42 and handed off to different masters in the same community. He worked as a fisherboy on Lake Volta for several years.

Each day he would go fishing at dawn and return in the evening. It was physically demanding work: casting and dragging fishing equipment, diving to remove tangles from nets, scooping water from the canoe. Felix also suffered abuse and sustained injuries at the hands of his masters. He was insulted, hit with paddles, caned, and starved.

Felix's brothers, who had been trafficked to the same village, feared that his master was going to inflict serious harm on him. They contacted their mother to rescue Felix. The issue was reported to the police for immediate action, and the media became involved; a child protection organization obtained information regarding Felix and his three siblings. While the rescue effort was complicated, and required the intervention of the judiciary service, Felix and his brothers were ultimately released and sent to a recovery center. BTCTE became involved during this time.

It was there that Felix started his education; he soon enrolled in mainstream schooling. He completed junior high school and eventually graduated from senior high school. He achieved exceptional scores on his exams, and was admitted to the University of Ghana.

As of today, Felix is studying to obtain a Bachelor of Arts degree. His story is a testament to achievement in the face of adversity: if kids are given the resources to succeed, they can accomplish anything.

- -Emotional support and comfort that comes from knowing that someone cares about their well-being.
